We have looked at your request to put in sidewalk along King Street from Albion Vaughan Road up to Sneath Road. The Regions November 2011 Active Transportation Study recommended paved shoulder along King Street and that was implemented. It did not recommend any sidewalk. The Environmental Assessment going on at Albion Vaughan Road and King Street is about implementing intersection improvements and the sidewalk request is out of the study area and out of the scope of work.

Many thanks for keeping me in the study loop of the Albion Vaughan Rd. & King St. assessment. I have lived at since 1985. While many things have remained the same - many things have in fact changed.

What has changed:

King St. from Sneath Rd. going west currently has a sidewalk on the south side

The TRCA has acquired the former Bolton camp. A new and improved service entrance for the camp is on the north side of King St. across from Sneath Rd.

Significant increase in pedestrian traffic with the establishment of the kill strip on the north and south side of King between Albion Vaughan and Sneath.

Increase in pedestrian traffic east and west from subdivisions on Evans Ridge

Sneath Rd. is now a bypass for students and walkers entering King St.

Pedestrians now include baby carriages, runners and students

Pedestrian traffic now extends to "year long" use

Pedestrian traffic occurs in the daytime, evening and nighttime

I still question why this section of King St. was not developed to serve the residents. Clearly, the population has increased and subsequently usage. Snow removal and street lights for pedestrians is better but far from safe. Please continue to monitor what is currently a high risk pedestrian area.
